This man **is** plumb. **He is wearing** an orange shirt, blue pants, and gray shoes. He has got a square face, and he **looks** happy.

This character **is** not attractive but he **looks** friendly and cheerful.



The character is very **muscular**. **He has** got a big chest and strong shoulders. **His** arms are **thick** with big muscles. **He is wearing** grey pants and dark blue shoes. **His** face is covered by a brown beard, and he has short brown hair.

This character looks very strong and powerful and looks handsome.





What are Comparative Adjectives?

We use them to show the difference between two things.

Usually, we add "-er" to the end of the word or use "more" before the word.

Examples:

- 1. Big -> **bigger** (A cat is bigger than a mouse.)
- 2. Small -> **smaller** (A mouse is smaller than a cat.)
- 3. Fast -> faster (A cheetah is faster than a turtle.)
- 4. Slow -> **slower** (A turtle is slower than a cheetah.)
- 5. Happy -> happier (I am happier when I play with my friends.)
- 6. More beautiful -> (A parrot is more beautiful than a crow.)

How to use?

Rule:

- For short words, add "-er": big -> bigger
- For long words, use "more": beautiful -> more beautiful

Short Words: Add "-er"

- 1. **Tall -> taller** (John is taller than Tim.)
- 2. Short -> shorter (This pencil is shorter than that one.)
- 3. Hot -> hotter (Summer is hotter than winter.)
- 4. Cold -> colder (Ice is colder than water.)
- 5. **Light -> lighter** (A feather is lighter than a stone.)
- 6. **Dark -> darker** (The room is darker at night.)

Long Words: Use "more"

- 1. More careful (She is more careful than him.)
- 2. More colorful (The rainbow is more colorful than the sky.)
- 3. **More expensive** (The car is more expensive than the bicycle.)
- 4. **More delicious** (Ice cream is more delicious than spinach.)
- 5. **More interesting** (This book is more interesting than that one.)
- 6. **More comfortable** (The sofa is more comfortable than the chair.)
